**Zines** are a means of direct communication between zine creator - 'zinester' - and audience. The contents of a zine often fall outside of traditional, authorized, and/or academic forms of writing: personal stories are common, spelling errors come with the territory, use of idioms/slang/pop culture references are frequent. As zines don't need to be run by editors or publishers before they are printed, the opportunities for free speech and free expression are vast. Zines are almost always sold (for a reasonable amount), often at a negotiable price, or they can be traded. This model is a kind of PWYC free speech, or just PWYC Speech.

**Forest City Zine Fiends** is a monthly zine club dedicated to incubating zine culture in London, Ontario. This group aims to share resources, support fellow members, and workshop ideas. Zine Fiends will occupy Support Gallery for the first two weeks of July, running an exhibition, pop-up shop, and series of free virtual events.



I don't know what I'm doing.

Not in general, not when it comes to zines, and certainly not regarding this art show. And you know what? That's the way I've been operating since I started making zines eight years ago and suffice to say, it works for me.

Zine Fiends started when I ran into a very, very cool person – we'll call them Leanne because that is their name – who told me about a zine club they had been involved in when they lived on the east coast. I have never been to the east coast and zine making had been a fulfilling yet lonely pursuit for me up until that point, so they idea of making zines in community with others was very intriguing. I let Leanne's idea of a zine club sit for a while, and after it had saturated I began Zine Fiends. I named it that because 'zine' kind of rhymes with 'fiend', and I pluralized 'fiend' to 'fiends' because I wanted other people to be involved.

Zine Fiends has taught me a lot about being a person. It has also taught me about what not to do as a leader and what bad leadership looks like. Bad leadership is letting petty grievances cloud your judgment. It's also being passive when members of your group are being bullied. Sometimes, bad leadership is pretending you have all the answers when you have no idea what you're doing. Maintaining this group has been a lot like the process of writing a zine: you learn as you go, you make so many mistakes oh my god, and ultimately you feel a sense of pride in what you accomplished. You saw a project through to the end, and not everyone does that.

I recently ran into a pal and her husband downtown and due to a combination of construction and not seeing each other in a while, we ended up walking and talking for several wonderful albeit trepidatious blocks. We talked about zines because we both make them (although not the husband – not yet, anyway. I believe in you, Hubert) and I said laughingly (in order to hide my very real fear and anxiety about this forthcoming show) "I don't know what I'm doing"! This pal was very reassuring in that moment, and it dawned on me that this is normally the space from which zines emerge for me: at the beginning, I know nothing. At the end, I have learned a lot.

Zine Fiends has turned into a meeting place for people interested in zinemaking. It is also a discussion group, a social club, and a space in which people can respectfully disagree. It is a very rare and special space, and that is fully a reflection of the people involved. So way to go, you fiends. It is also sometimes a pseudonym I use when making zines. Lastly, but not leastly, it is also a nickname I have kind of given myself.

I don't know what I'm doing, but I want to figure it out and I want to pass on what I know to other people so it will be easier for them. Thank you for reading this introduction and I hope you enjoy the show.


